Library Mission

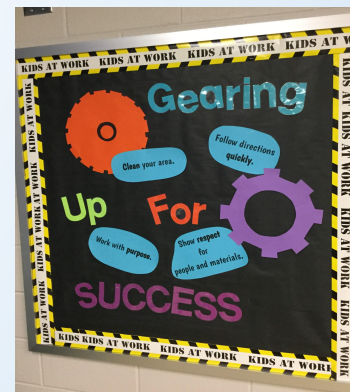

This Exploration Station, as the students call it, provides a space for dedicated opportunities for independent and collaborative open-ended challenges. Next year, we will focus on critical thinking skills by incorporating even more STEM resources and connections.



Teaching & Collaboration



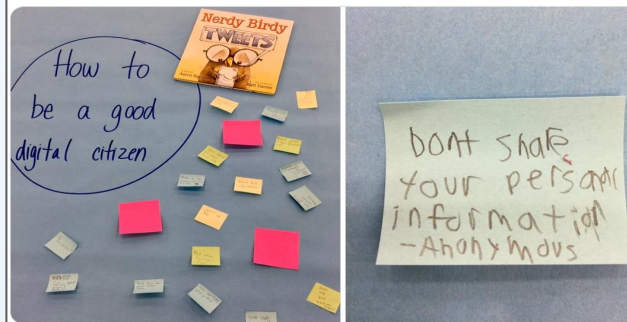
From GT research groups to STEM activities to specific academic requests from teachers, a librarian's job is never done in isolation. Teachers work as a team because **all students are our students!**

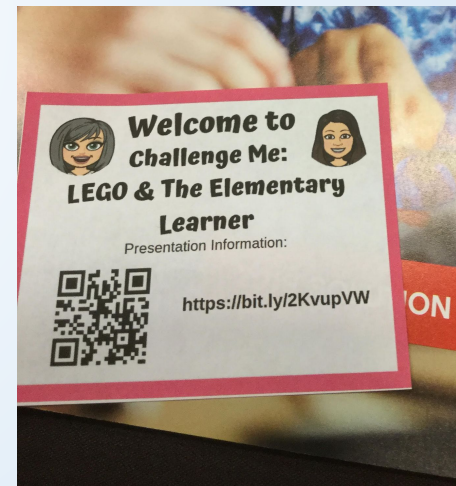

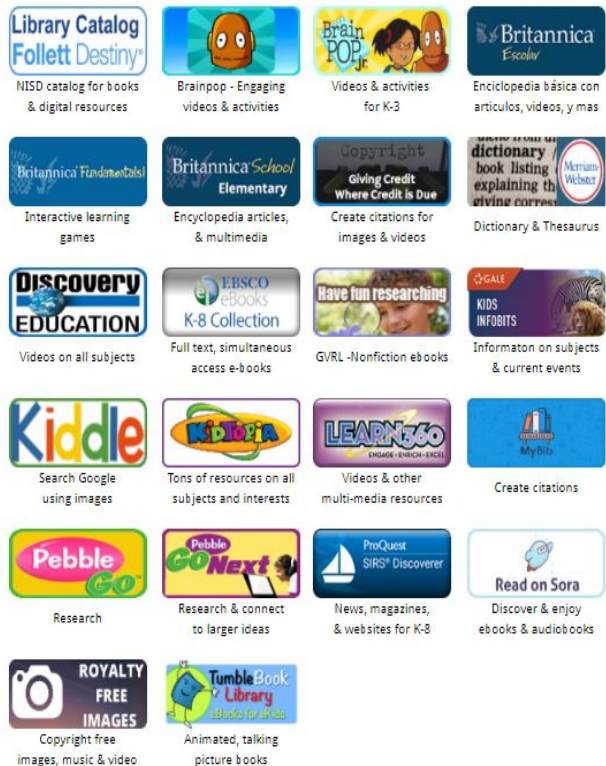
Professional Development & Leadership



Thanks to campus, district, and Region 20 offerings, I was able to attend **72.5 hours** of professional development this school year. The ones that stood out the most focused on STEAM and literature connections at the Elementary Technology Conference in Galveston. I learned new ways to engage students with increased critical thinking and problem solving activities. A book study with fellow librarians helped me improve questioning and critical thinking. I am also thankful for timely district trainings on Google Classroom and digital instruction. Teachers never stop learning!

I served on the district Storyfest planning committee and led coding and technology training for other district librarians.

On campus, I served as the Literacy Committee chair and sent numerous s'mores and how-to videos to staff members so they could efficiently utilize NISD digital resources. During Distance Learning, I collaborated with other librarians to create the district 5th grade Enrichment S'more.

Collection Development



Resources added this year:

Weeding is removing items from the collection that are irrelevant, outdated, or damaged. Materials are evaluated by publication date, physical condition, and contextual fit for our library.

Students should associate reading with interesting, relevant books without physical damage. Because many of our books have been *well loved* by students over the past 8 years (and are therefore falling apart), I weeded 2,877 items this year.

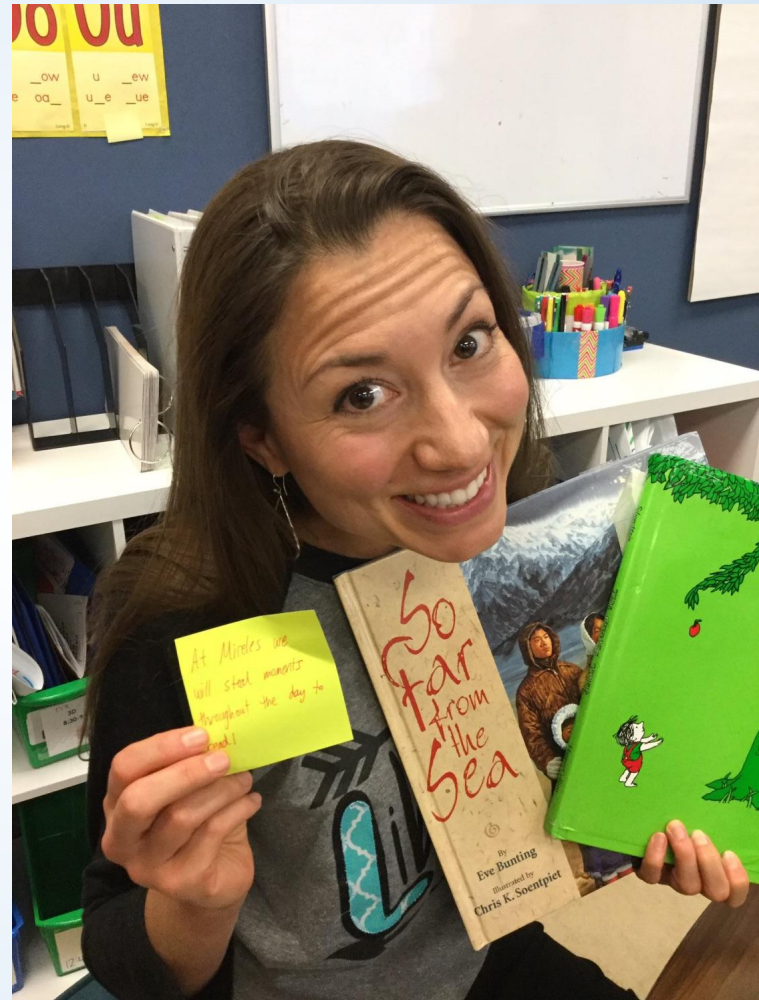

Library Use



The library is a **large, flexible space** used to host many other programs before, during, and after school.

Staff members meet here after school for monthly faculty meetings, literacy committee meetings, leadership team meetings and general professional development. We use the space for specific trainings like CER/Optic, Diabetes Awareness, IRI, Depth and Complexity, TELPAS, and Red Wagon (new teacher) staff development. Additionally, the library is the place to be for baby and bridal showers and farewell parties!

Teachers also use the space for small group intervention and research, 1:1 testing, and our annual Kindergarten Roundup.

Counselors use the library for Donuts for our Little (military) Heroes, SACADA (drug and alcohol prevention) sessions for students, anti-bullying sessions for students, and informative Counselor Coffees for parents. The library was also used for monthly Pillar Pals meetings.

Library Use



Parents meet in the library for G/T Awareness and Dyslexia Awareness sessions, PTA board meetings, SAT meetings, new teacher meet-and-greets, Donuts with Dad, and Early Literacy Education nights with Angela Garza.

The **community** used our facilities for voting. Oasis mentors meet 1:1 with students weekly to work on reading skills.

The **nurse** uses our space for dental health presentations, spinal and vision/hearing screenings, and growth/development films for our older students.

Students regularly utilize computers throughout the day for supplemental instructional programs. The library was a peaceful home to tutoring and testing sessions.

Facilities



Our **Library Classroom** is comprised of 8 tables near a laptop/projector.

With 10 bean bags, the **Biography Cove** is a favorite reading location for students.

We have 11 **desktop computers**, 2 **self-checkout computers**, 30 **chromebooks**, and 1 **laptop** for student, teacher, and community use.

The **Library Workroom** and **AV Resource Room** are now situated with tables and chairs to serve as offices for itinerant employees and small group instruction/testing locations.



The **Everyone Section** houses picture and easy non-fiction books, scoop rockers, wiggle cushions, and a rocking chair.

Conclusion



The Mireles Library is a hub of resources--physical, digital, and human. The facility brings us together for the purpose of becoming better than we were. Though this year's challenges stretched us in ways we would not have chosen, our students have shown evidence of emotional and academic growth and our staff members report more resolve in convictions, more fluency in digital resources, and more confidence in personal and professional abilities.
